As we reach the end of a long autumn term, I want to offer a heartfelt thank you to our students and staff for your continuing hard work, and to families for your support of the school, its staff and its policies.

It seems like a long time ago now, but the term began with the celebration of the previous Year 11 and Year 13's results, which were the best collective results obtained by the school. Year 11 results remained strong, enabling students to go onto their desired next steps, whilst Year 13 results showed the beneficial impact of last year's investment in sixth form, with results improving to significantly above national average in both attainment and progress terms.

Additionally, we welcomed our fantastic new Year 7 cohort to the school in September. The transition to high school went very well and Year 7 have all settled into their classes and our routines admirably.

And alongside this, we have had lots of enriching opportunities for Y7-13 throughout the term, the highlights of which are covered in this letter. These have included performances, an MP visit from Hilary Benn, restart a heart day, and charity fundraising to name but a few.



So, as we approach the Christmas break, we look forward to an opportunity to recharge and see loved ones. And we would also like to say thank you to departing colleagues who are leaving us on maternity leaves, and to Miss McAndrew who is departing Temple Moor to begin a new life in the Falkland Islands.

I hope you all have a restful and merry Christmas, and we look forward to welcoming students back on January 5th.




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ATTENDANCE MATTERS

Attendance remains a focus nationally and at Temple Moor, as it is proven to be in children's interest to attend school regularly. Summer's GCSE results proving strong evidence to support this, highlighting the impact that regular attendance to school has on students' outcomes.

The average grade obtained by students in each attendance category is shown below:



This clearly shows that students who are in school 95% of the time, benefit massively from attending, attaining at least a grade higher in every subject they sit. The Progress 8 value of +0.94 means that students make nearly 1 grade more progress than the national average for students.

It also clearly shows the declining outcomes as absence becomes more prevalent. This is because students miss out of the well planned and delivered curriculum, and they accumulate significant gaps in their knowledge.

To support students' outcomes and life chances, the message is clear. Every day in school is an important one, and therefore students should attend unless they

are too unwell to do so. To guide parents in making these decisions, the NHS have set up a website:

Holidays in term time are also a significant source of absence and we continue to discourage these being taken due to the impact it has.

Please support the school by ensuring that excellent attendance, above 95%, remains a priority in the new year so that students can be fully supported to achieve their potential.

A huge well done to the 730 students who have an attendance at 95% or better. As the school year progresses, we hope that even more students are able to reach this target and for those currently there, that this can be maintained.













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FREE O2 DATA

The National Databank exists to provide SIM cards for people who can't access the Internet, and works like a food bank but for mobile data.

Over the festive period the national data bank is increasing access by hosting databanks in every O2 store. This means people experiencing difficulties in affording this can access free data. People can receive 25GB of free O2 data per month for 12 months, helping them stay connected to essential services and loved ones. All someone has to do is visit an O2 store to pickup a SIM and they can even keep their original number.

YEAR 7 STUDENTS: MAPPING OUR SCHOOL FOR BIODIVERSITY

Our Year 7 students have been busy outdoors, taking part in an exciting science project: mapping our school site for the National Education Nature Park.

Acting as Community Scientists, the students carefully surveyed our grounds—from paved areas to grassy fields and hedges—to create a detailed habitat map. This crucial first step helps us understand the current biodiversity of our school.

The data they collected will serve two key purposes:

School Transformation: Identifying areas where we can introduce new habitats, such as wildflower patches or ponds, turning 'grey to green' to boost local wildlife.

Global Research: Contributing to the Natural History

Museum's global research database, helping scientist's understand and predict nature recovery across the UK.

This project will continue in the new year with a work experience opportunity for Year 7 students, giving them hands-on experience as environmental scientists.

We are delighted to see our students developing practical skills while making a positive impact on the environment.











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ROAD SAFETY AWARENESS WEEK

In addition to assemblies on road safety, we were delighted to welcome the educational theatre company Split Second for a high-impact performance tailored specifically for our Year 7 cohort.

This engaging session focused on promoting responsible behaviour and raising awareness of the potential dangers associated with roads and traffic.

Through powerful storytelling, the Split Second production highlighted the consequences of poor decisions while walking or cycling near highways. It served as a vital reminder to our newest students about the importance of vigilance and following safety protocols during their daily commutes.
